From her bedroom balcony, looking out at the moonlit night, Juliet swoons over this street rascal, Romeo, a son of a rival family "in fair Verona," and asks herself this poignant question: What's in a name?

Her own response seems a form of self-assurance that this boy, Romeo, is different than his family's reputation might predispose a casual observer to believe. "That which we call a rose by any other word would smell as sweet."

There is a kernel of truth in her estimation, I believe – particularly, that a person is not merely, or solely, defined by their past or their family's infamy.

But a name can also be a powerful sign, even a prophetic indicator for a person or an institution's actions and, if you will allow me to dip into mythological terminology, their destiny.

Which brings me to this reference to John 5 where Jesus, coming to Jerusalem for "a festival of the Jews," apparently enters the city from the "Sheep Gate," and approaches a set of pools, cisterns of some kind, where there are "many ill, blind, lame, and paralyzed people" laying about. This pool is called, depending upon the manuscript set a Biblical translator is working from, Bethesda.

Specifically in John's Gospel the word, the name for this pool, is referenced as being "in Hebrew/Aramaic," which gives us an indicator for why this pool is called what it is. Beth or beit is "house," and chesed is "mercy."

This pool, where the ill, blind, lame, and paralyzed folks in Jerusalem have gathered is known as a "house of mercy."

So, I ask you, Bethesda community, "what's in a name?" Is our congregation's name a description of who we have been in the past? Or is it a prophetic voice calling us into our future? Or might it be both?

Friends, the world is on fire around us with anger, hatred, violence, and harm. Families are strained to the breaking point. Stress, anxiety, loneliness, and isolation are epidemics in our country.

And here we are – "House of Mercy" – a place of healing and reconciliation right in the fray, in the midst of all the messiness of the world.

What we as a community of faith have to offer the wounded, beloved, beautiful world is precisely what Jesus brought with him for that man lying on his mat for thirty eight years, waiting to be helped into the waters of the Pool of Bethesda. Healing. Wholeness. Love. Mercy.

How might we be sent out to be pools of healing in the world?

What's in a name? Perhaps more than we ever could have imagined.

This year we had additional help from the daycare as their summer project was to design fabric blocks into quilt tops. Their teacher, Clarine Nelson sewed the blocks together and the quilters finished them by adding the batting, tying, pinning and binding them all together.

Remember the guilting project for Lutheran World Relief with memorials and donations as there are costs, such as purchase of batting and shipping to this project. The quilters are always looking for new members to help. There are tasks for everyone, even if you don't sew. Join us on Wednesday from 9 to 12. We can always use the help.






